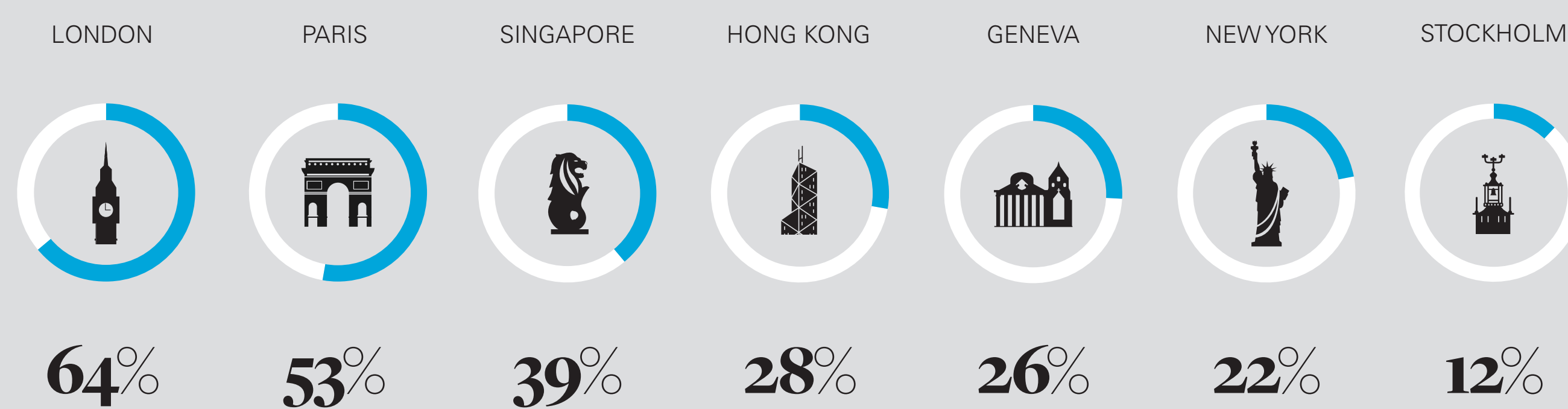

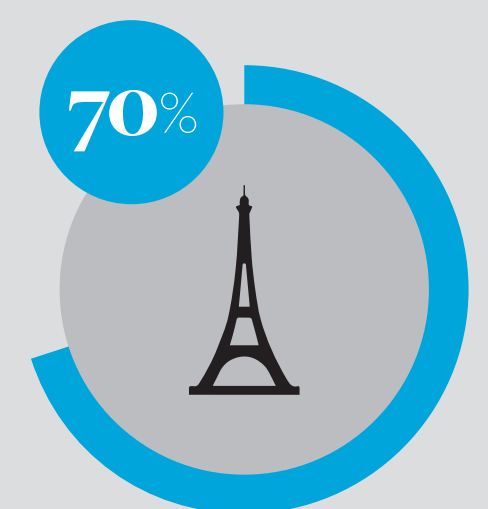

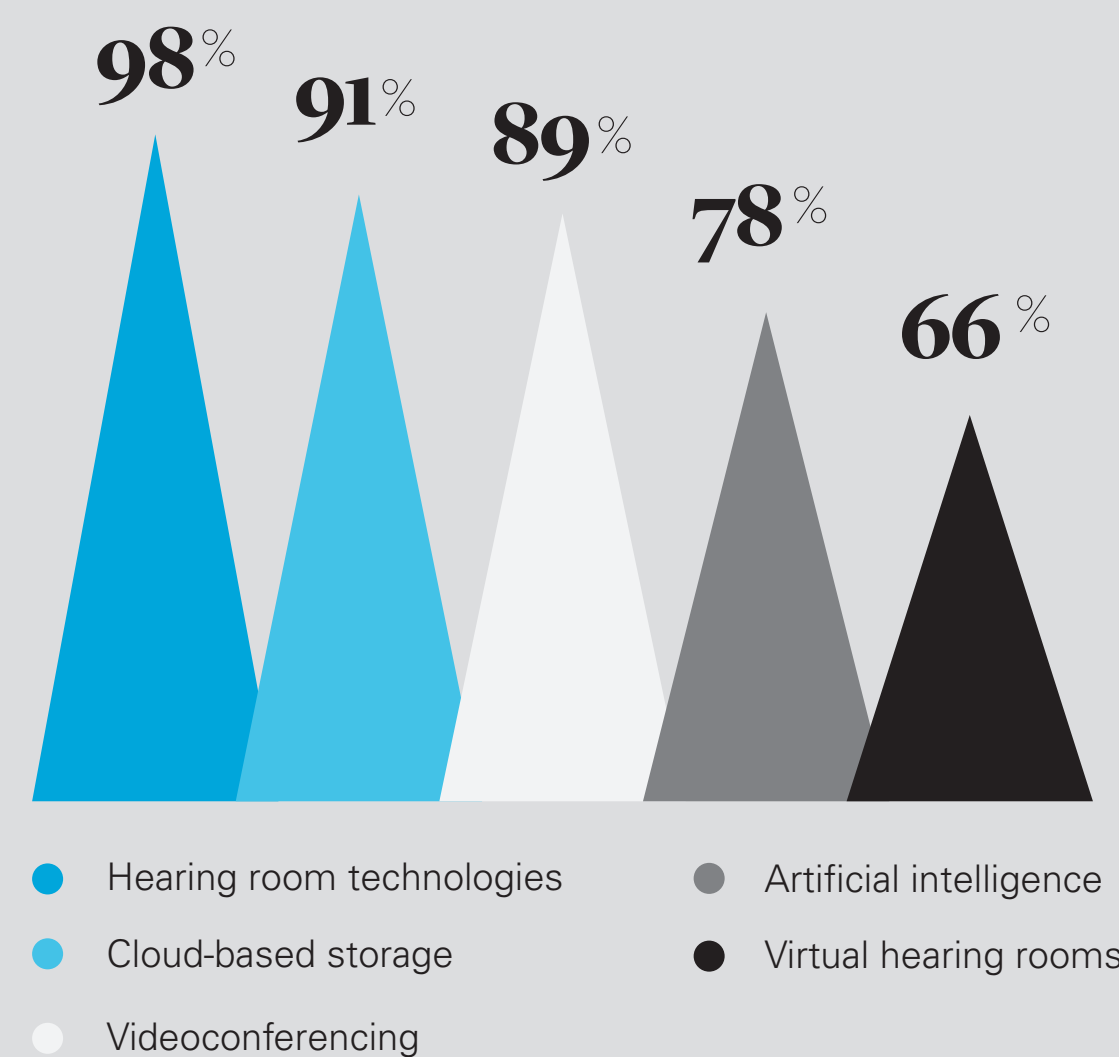
Use of information technology to aid efficiency in arbitration



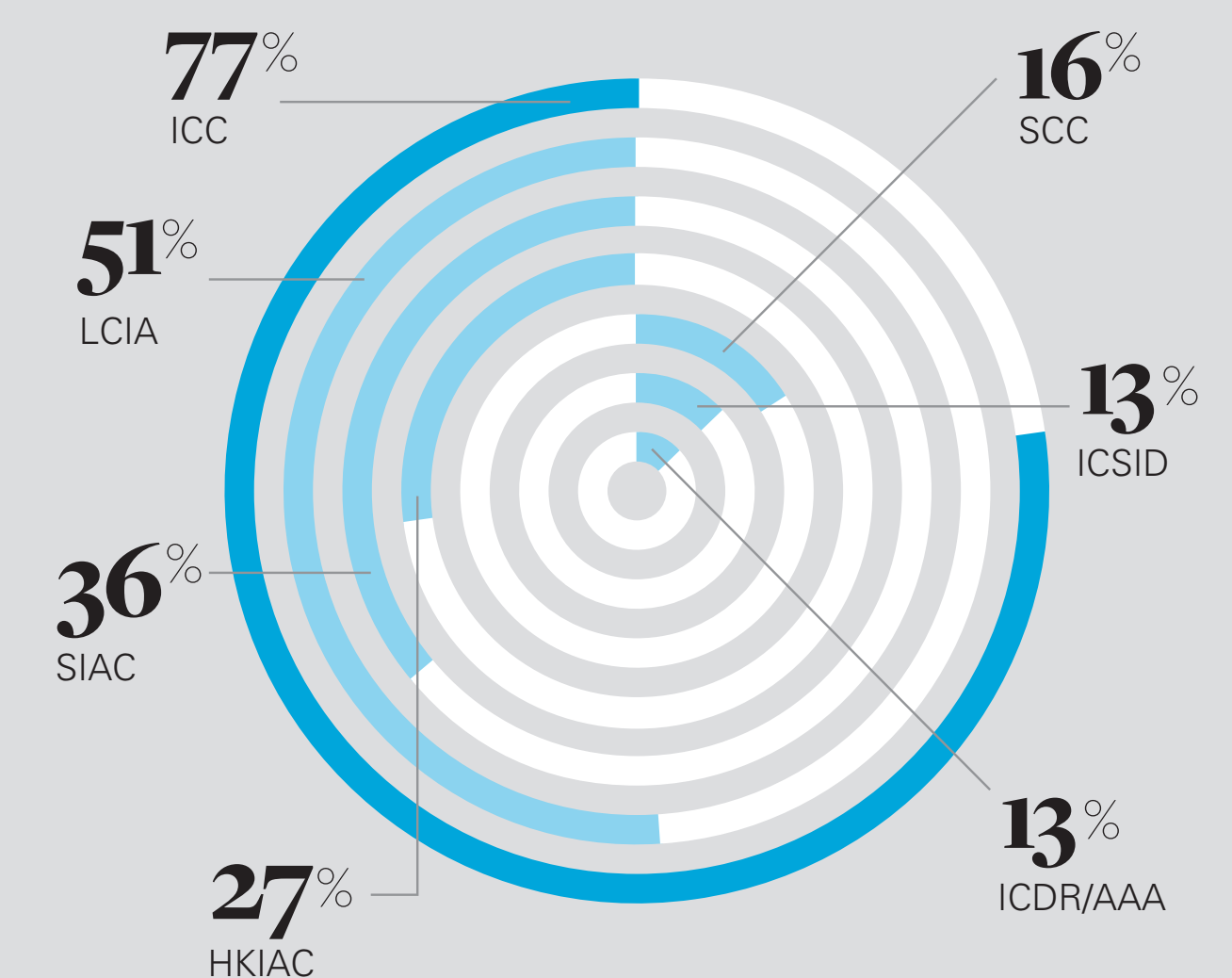

Technology that should be used more often in arbitration



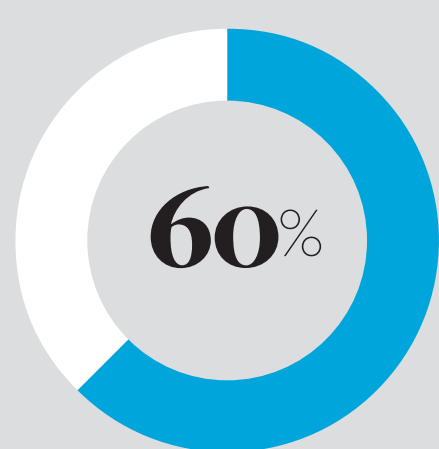
Most preferred arbitral institutions



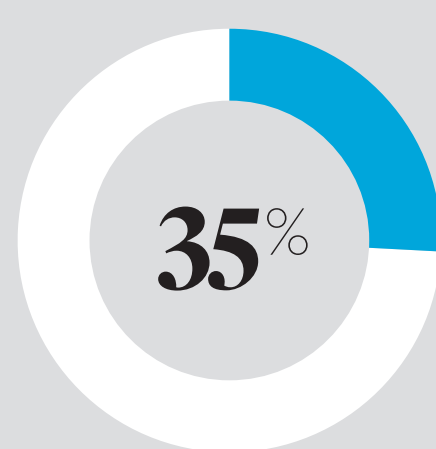
Diversity across arbitral tribunals

Respondents who agree there has been progress made in the last five years in respect of different aspects of diversity

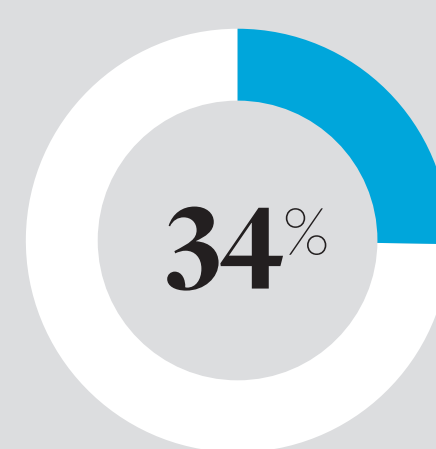

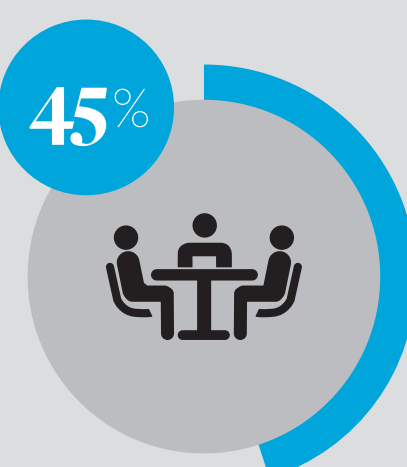
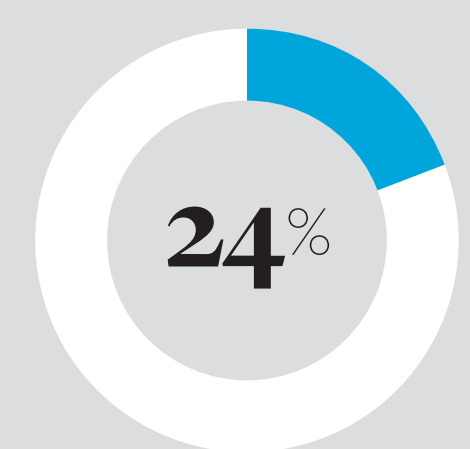
